This work is a great introduction to abbreviations. You can explain to children that we use abbreviations to shorten long, frequently-used words or terms.

There are hundreds of abbreviations, so this is only a small sample. A child who is interested in learning more can certainly research the topic and come up with more abbreviations.

These cards can be divided into two sets, if you like, and since it contains abbreviations for both standard and metric measurements, you can omit whichever one you don't use (although I think it's nice for kids to be familiar with both kinds of measurement).

Other imp. abbreviations include:

- months of the year**
- days of the week**
- country names**
- state or province names**

There's a wide range of ways to write abbreviations: some are all caps, some have periods and some don't. In many cases, it's acceptable with or without the period; caps or no caps. For example: **am** or **a.m.** or **AM**.
